Working Paper (Submission Guidelines)

The objective of the centre is to advance analysis of foreign policy, international relations and security issues and contribute to the expansion of knowledge of Indian and international security issues and policy and generate an awareness amongst the public at large. GNLU seeks to address the decision makers, strategic planners, academics and the media in India, South Asia and the world. The aim of the centre is to provide a platform for scholars, institutions and practitioners of foreign relation analysis, security studies, area studies, international law to interact and provide another point of view for the decision makers at both the national and international level.

Furthermore, it aims to undertake academic research leading to solutions to the challenges facing India, South Asia and the Globe. The centre shall provide timely analysis of India's foreign policy and international affairs and recommend policy alternatives, with the belief that security and world stability are best advanced through a commitment to peace, justice and environmental protection as well as economic, political, and social rights. It also aims to build collaborative networks of researchers, policy-makers and business representatives, media and citizens nationally and internationally and to disseminate our findings and views through publications, seminars and conferences.

The working papers are one of its attempts to improve the accessibility of research for faculties, practitioners and students to reflect an idea or concept that is still being developed thereby improving the opportunities for discussion and comments. They will also speed up the circulation of. It allows authors to quickly disseminate new ideas and with feedback authors can modify their work and before it finally appear in journals or books.

There is no topic restriction, but working paper that advances the theoretical and substantive discourse in the discipline of International Relations and Security Studies are welcome, but will be subject to review for appropriateness of the

content and the objective for which it is purported. The Working Paper series is an important resource for the Centre to advertise its academic qualities. We therefore retain the editorial right to reject papers we do not consider to be of sufficiently high standard.

Submission Guidelines:

- All working papers should be submitted in word format as an email attachment to GNLU Centre for Foreign Policy and Security Studies at gcfps@gnlu.ac.in
- Who Can Submit: All faculty members and students of GNLU, all doctoral students of GNLU, other visiting fellows, researchers and visitors to GNLU are encouraged to submit their ongoing research work to be published as Working papers.

Notes for Contributors:

- Working papers should resemble articles in a good academic journal in terms of quality, length and format.
- All papers must include English language abstracts (250 words max.) and a list of up to 5 keywords.
- Papers should be no longer than 15.000 words (incl. footnotes and references). The papers submitted should be in MS word format, Font:
 Garamond Size: 12, with 1.5" margin on the Left and 1.0" margin on the right, top and bottom. Reference should be sequentially arranged and should appear at the end.
- In exceptional cases, working papers may also be short collections of articles
 with a common thematic focus. Complete manuscripts of edited conference
 volumes should not be submitted as working papers.
- Referencing Style: Chicago Manual, 15th Edition

- Cover Page: The cover page of the paper should include the title of the working paper along with the name of the Author, asterisked, with the author's designation, short bio of not more than 100 words and the contact details.
- Peer Review: All submitted papers will undergo a minimal peer review to make sure that those truly unfit for publication are excluded. This minimal peer review is to make sure that quality work gets published.
- Copyright: The author will hold the copyright and not GNLU. GNLU will merely host the author's work.
- Authors who want to eventually submit their text to a journal or edited volume should ascertain whether the editors or publishers will accept prepublication as a working paper. Most academic journals do not object to submission of texts that have been published as working papers. Several journals, however, refuse to review or publish papers that are already been submitted. In some cases submission will only be accepted if the text is sufficiently different from a version published as a working paper. Since practices on this question vary across and within disciplines and change over time, it is the responsibility of authors to check the rules applied by those publication venues that they consider for future submissions.
