- Citation: GJLDP prefers the in footnotes which should be numbered sequentially. However, endnotes numbered sequentially or notes/ references listed alphabetically can also be presented as a list of References at the end of the manuscript. The journal has drawn the system, as well as some of the illustrations, from both *Chicago Manual of Style (CMS) 16th Edition* (http://www.chicagomanualofstyle.org/tools_citationguide.html) and for legal citation *Harvard Bluebook 19th Edition*
- The author/s are request to strictly follow the guidelines (stated below) and the style sheet for citation and references. This will help reduce processing times of articles that have been accepted for publication.
